

BURIAL SITES OF NOTABLE LANCASTRIANS



Visit the final resting places of some of the people who made a mark on Lancaster's history.

THADDEUS STEVENS 1792–1868

**Shreiner-Concord Cemetery
Chestnut St. & Mulberry St.**

Congressman and fierce opponent of slavery and discrimination against African Americans, Stevens sought to secure their rights during Reconstruction. He was buried in Shreiner Cemetery, one of the only cemeteries at the time to allow the burial of people regardless of race.

LYDIA HAMILTON SMITH 1813–1884

**St. Mary's Catholic Cemetery
Plum St. & New Holland Ave.**

Long-time housekeeper of Thaddeus Stevens and a prominent African American businesswoman after his death. Stevens and Smith were active in the Underground Railroad.

CHARLES DEMUTH 1883–1935

**Lancaster Cemetery
Lemon St.**

American watercolor painter who developed a style of painting known as Precisionism.

C. EMLÉN URBAN 1863–1939

**Greenwood Cemetery
Highland Ave.**

The leading architect in Lancaster from the 1890s to the 1920s. Many of his buildings are still in use today.

DINAH MCINTIRE 1706–1819

**St. James Episcopal Cemetery
Duke St. & Orange St.**

A former enslaved woman born in Maryland, at the time of her death owned two properties at the intersection of West Strawberry and West Vine Streets.

PRES. JAMES BUCHANAN 1791–1868

**Woodward Hill Cemetery
Duke St. & Orange St.**

The 15th President of the United States, Buchanan served immediately prior to the American Civil War. He remains the only President to be elected from Pennsylvania and to remain a lifelong bachelor.

OUTSIDE LANCASTER CITY

BARNEY EWELL 1918–1996

**Conestoga Memorial Park
95 2nd Lock Rd., Lancaster**

American athlete who won one gold and two silver medals at the 1948 Summer Olympics. Ewell Plaza, in downtown Lancaster City, is named after him.
